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On Google I/O in June, the company announced that the mobile version of the Google Chrome browser had more than 300 million users. This was a big increase of ten times compared to the previous year. Nearly six months later, Google executive Darin Fisher told those gathered at the Chrome Dev Summit that the current number is up to 400 million mobile Chrome users. In addition to the new look of Material Design, and changes that have made the browser safer, Chrome has added some new features as well. A change that Google made was to remove a 300 ms delay that the browser used, to see if the user was going to double tap on the screen. By removing this delay, Chrome is now softer for the user and allows the developer to have more control over animations. Web pages also take the color of the toolbar and are displayed next to apps in the recent app view added to Android 5.0. Fisher also showed some slides, which you can see in the video below, showing that those asking for the disappearance of the mobile browser might be jumping the gun. He talked about improving performance, and giving more of the workload to the GPU of a mobile device. This movement alone could save battery life. And he also referenced Google's new mobile tag in search results, helping users find a website optimized for the smaller mobile screen. Whether you're a Chrome user or one of the 100 million Android users who use Opera, or even if you're using another mobile browser, you'll find Fisher's main speech fascinating. Xmarks also has some extras, including providing information about websites when searching. I find the feature annoying and turning it off; you may want too. Google Quick Scroll Google Quick Scroll resolves my biggest complaint when searching: After clicking on a search result and going to a web page, you don't know where to find the text you searched for. With this witty extension, after you search and finish on a page, you'll see text at the bottom right of Chrome, as you can see below, which shows the text in context on the page. Click and jump directly to this text. It is one of the biggest time savers for frequent Internet search engines. Facebook for Google Chrome Any Chrome user who uses Facebook will want facebook extension for Google Chrome. Click on your icon, and you will be able to read your Facebook news feed and wall, as well as update your status, without having to visit Facebook. You can see it in action, below. I.S. Tab Like it or not, there are many web pages built specifically for Internet Explorer. Visit one of them in Chrome and it breaks ... unless you have I.S. Tab Similar to an extension that does the same thing for Firefox, it will let you see a site using I.S. right inside a Chrome tab. Do FlashBlock Fan Flash ads and other flash content bother you?
